Science/Learning Support Report

Term 4 is now in full swing and there is a lot happening across the school in the Science and Learning Support Faulty!

Most notably, we are fast approaching the examination period for both Stage 4 and 5! What better time to get out those old notes and brush up on those earlier topics; teachers will gladly provide guidance and support to all willing students.



Stage 4 continue experiments to test different forces and shapes, as they work toward using

Tinkercad software to design and print a racing dragster throughout the term! While this bubbles along in the background, all classes are now jumping right into their Guided Research Project, which will see them investigate the factors which affect the growth of radish seedlings.



Classes have had big input into the experimental design and method, with a few classes even hoping to test the effects of cola and coffee on plant growth (and hopefully some may take on a lesson about how too much sugar and caffeine may affect the health of a living organism!).

All students are strongly encouraged to take their work home using USB drives, email, or Google documents to get a leading edge on their research and report presentation! I would also like to remind those students aspiring for that 100% of a few things: result that drafts can be submitted for marking before the due date (in exchange you will receive helpful feedback and advice); your teachers LOVE answering your questions about the task; and the marking criteria is available to all students as both a print copy and digital copy. I can't wait to see everyone's great results!

Also this week (can we fit any more in?!) we had the **VALID test** for all of Year 8. This is a computer-based, multimedia test. All students will receive a personal report on their results in Term 1, next year!

<u>Stage 5</u> are presently hard at work on an in-class research task, in which they are investigating current issues affecting our world. Students were given a few options, allowing them to pursue a topic that is of interest to them; including The Greenhouse Effect, Loss of Biodiversity and Waste Management.

Each student will evaluate the impacts of these issues from various angles and make a decision about the moral and social impacts of addressing (or not addressing!) these issues. This task is due at the end of the week, and again, students are encouraged to take work home and start conversations with friends and families about these complex issues.

Stage 6 are almost fully adjusted to being the big fish and enjoying their science studies, with Chemistry students enjoying a

marked increase in practical experience (and moderately stronger acids) as they investigate equilibrium systems and uncover *YET MORE LIES* I told them in Junior Science about how chemical reactions work!



Physics are investigating circular motion and finding great satisfaction in those elegant formulae (and presumably having a lot of fun... swinging things around in circles? Not sure, I leave the physics in the very capable hands of Mr Joel White!)

Learning Support continue working hard with their trademark enthusiasm and sense of curiosity and fun! They are looking forward to joining us in the Dragster Challenge, developing their computer skills and getting their creative and problem solving hats on!

A big thank you to our wonderful students who come to class prepared, interested, and give every task their all. You take risks, ask questions, and you value your learning- you are the reason we come to work every day!

ABOUT THE GPS COWS PROJECT

A key issue facing regional, rural and remote communities around the world is the low level of digital literacy among some cohorts of students. This is particularly the case for students involved in agricultural studies where it is commonly perceived that digital literacy is not relevant to their future occupation. However, this perception is far from the truth, as the reality of farming today means students who intend on entering the

agricultural workforce must have excellent comprehension of technology. The agricultural industry is changing with the everincreasing use of technology across the supply chain demanding a workforce with higher degree skills in STEM and digital literacy to facilitate the transformation of this sector.

The GPS Cows program (GPS Cows) is a collaborative project bringing together researchers, industry professionals and educators in both Australia and the USA who understand the importance of, and are passionate about engaging students in agri-tech. The aim of GPS Cows is to increase the knowledge and skills of high school students in emerging agri-tech, specifically tools and systems which provide animal location and behaviour data, and to encourage them to consider tertiary study and a career in the agricultural sector. It is also hoped that the international collaboration will demonstrate to students the importance of agriculture globally and increase their knowledge and appreciation of the industry in other countries.

Maths/CAPA News

Stage 4 are currently working on the percentages topic. **4E** embarked on a spreadsheet activity as their assessment and their diligence and application was amazing. Stage 4 will have their semester examination next week on either the 14th or 15th November. To revise for the exams, students are encouraged to read their notes, do previous assessments again and utilise Mathletics.

Year 9 have been working hard revising for their Yearly Examinations which will cover topics of indices, measurement, equations and financial mathematics. Their current topic of study has been financial mathematics which involves calculating the tax payable for differing salaries with various deductions.

Year 10 completed their semester exam yesterday and they performed admirably in all aspects of the exam. They are currently working on properties of geometrical figures where they are expanding on their knowledge of parallel lines, triangles and quadrilaterals.

Stage 5 are currently working on financial mathematics which involves calculating weekly wages including situations where penalty rates are applicable. They will soon be knuckling down in preparation for their Yearly Examinations.

Year 11 Mathematics is Abbey, has completed the Preliminary Course. So far this term she has studied geometry and geometrical applications of calculus, which constitutes one of the largest percentage of questions in the HSC.

Mr White's Year 11 Mathematics is underway. Participants have taken to the new trigonometry topic with flair, showing great promise for future tasks. Keep an eye out for their new investigation task, where we will be finding answers to the mythical golden ratio.

My Year 11 class have gotten off to a flier. Anne and Mollie are killing it and Karlie has been a welcome addition to the class, providing a myriad of tips on applying foundation and mascara. Terry is his usual chatty self, whilst Colin, Toby, Wyatt and Jacob have been working about as hard as expected. Moisha will soon find her footing and I believe she has the potential to become an engineer. Or maybe even an employee of some sort.

Congratulations to Year 12 on completing your HSC! We are proud of the effort and perseverance you have demonstrated and we hope you are too. We would appreciate you returning all resources you have borrowed ... no questions asked! Please remember if you need assistance in the future, we are always here to help.

So far in Stage 4 music this term we have been exploring the music of Africa. Students have been immersed in polyrhythmic activities using various membranophones and idiophones and performing rhythmic ostinatos in both small and larger class ensembles. Later in the term students will learn more about traditional score conventions through the use of notation software to compose their own polyrhythms. Two of the Stage 4 classes, **4O** and **4V** will look at making their own membranophones. Traditionally membranophones use animal skin for the drum head. Some of the boys have volunteered to bring in goat skin but I think we'll stick to muslin cloth!
