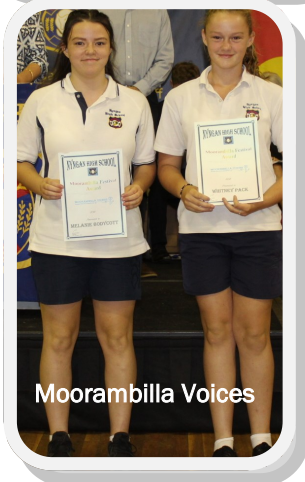

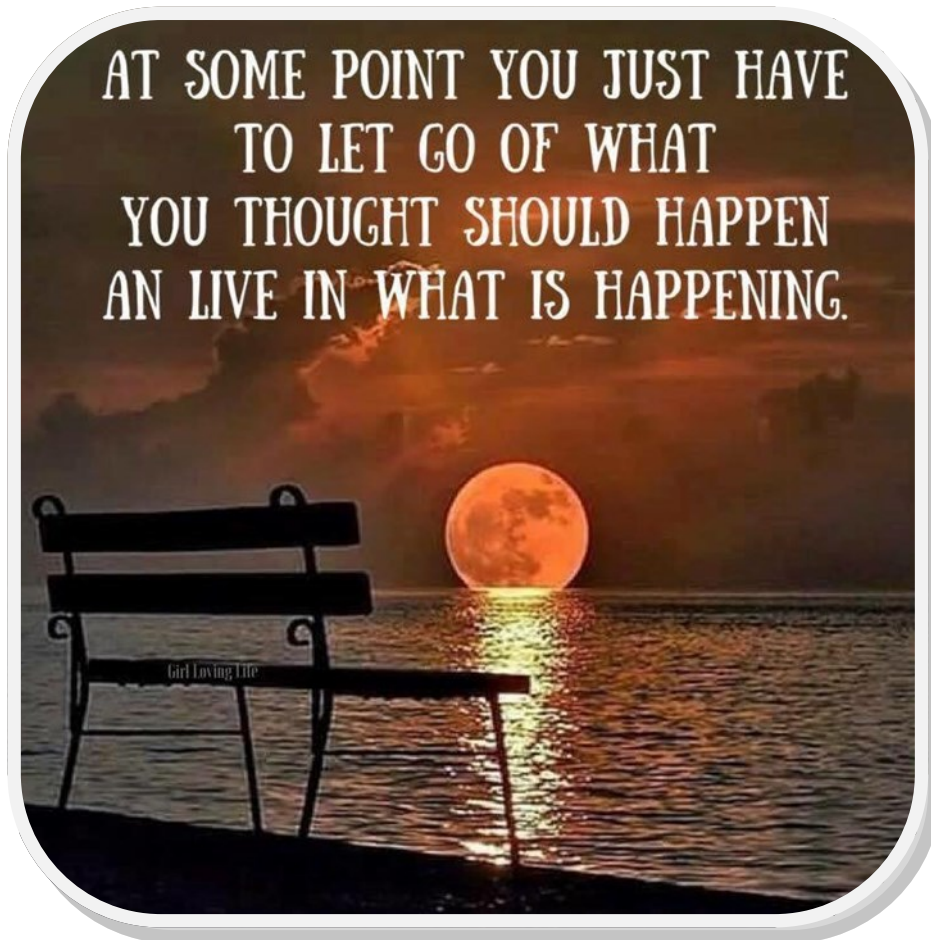

I would like to acknowledge the Wongaibon people who are the traditional owners of the land and pay my respect to elders both past and present and extend that respect to all Aboriginal people.

Humanity is our Positive Education focus for this term. Humanity can be something that is both hard to define and something that can feel much bigger than us as individuals. However, humanity is simply about connecting with others, understanding others and being respectful of others knowing that we are all human and that, at times, we all have struggles. I know I have had a few struggles lately and it is the connection with others that has really helped.

Humanity incorporates the character strengths of love, kindness and social intelligence.

Incorporating the character strength of kindness in your life means to be kind and generous to others. You can never be too busy to lend a hand or do someone a favor. Kind people enjoy doing things for others even if they don't know them well. Kindness falls under the humanity virtue as it flourishes in caring relationships with others.

To connect as humans we need to have social intelligence. Social intelligence means you are aware of the motives and feelings of other people and you know how to react in social situations with people from all walks of life. It doesn't matter what skin colour, what nationality or whether you are male or female but you know how to communicate with everyone. The most important thing is what we do with our awareness and how we use it to connect with others.

Finally love is also a trait of humanity. It is similar to kindness except that the feelings are reciprocated. When you love you are loved back. To love you need to be compassionate and free of judgment which can be an extremely difficult thing to do especially with people we don't know.

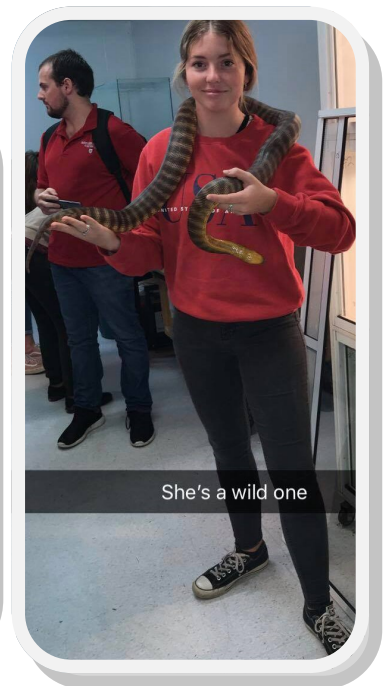

Lock 'em Up, Knock 'em Down Dubbo Excursion

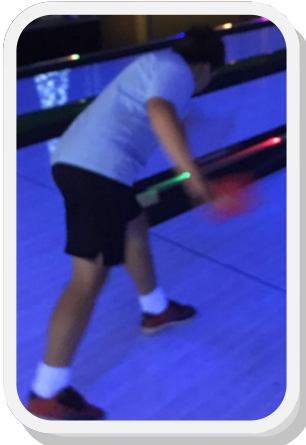
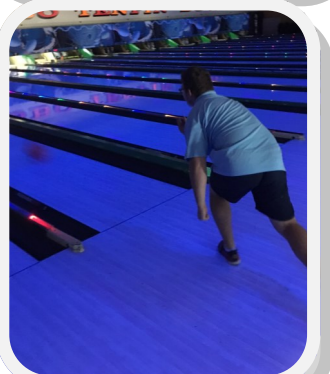
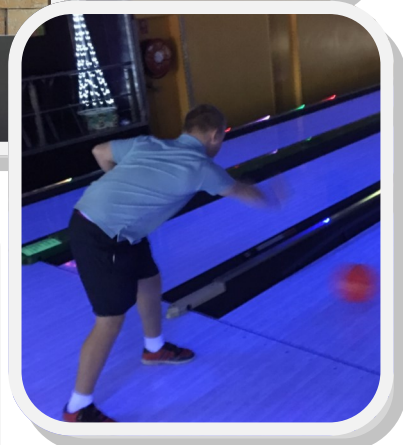
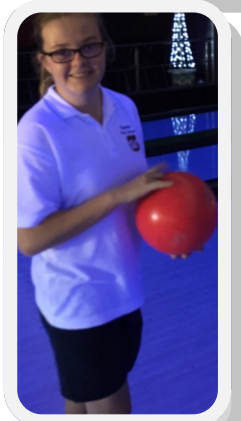
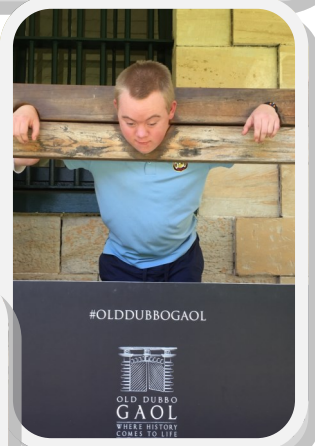
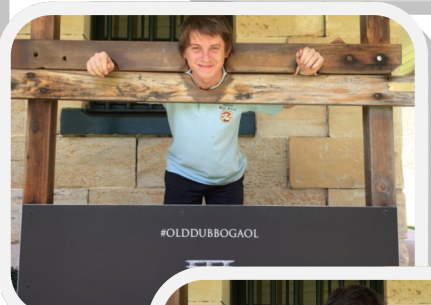

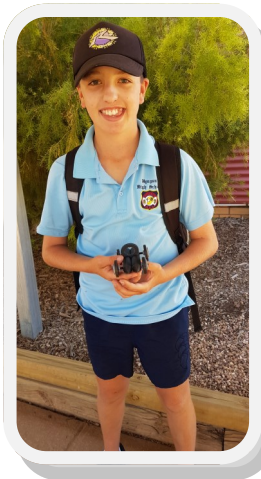


Science/Learning Support

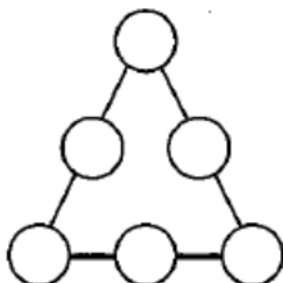
