## From the Principal

Dear Parents and Members of our School Community

Welcome to the final newsletter for 2011. What a year we have had. I have been truly humbled by the success that we have achieved as a school and so proud of the many individual performances across so many areas of education.

We began the year by welcoming a number of new staff to our school. Mrs Hunt, Mr Hunt, Miss Hamilton, Ms Ireland, Mrs Carter, Mrs Underwood and Mrs Swift. We also welcomed staff throughout the year including Mrs Holmes, Mrs Crowley, Mr and Mrs Bockos, Mr Bangura, Ms Weldon, Mr Jeffery and Mrs Jayne Walsh. We also farewelled Mrs Colwell, Miss Mander Jones and Mrs Denise McCarthy who retired after 34 wonderful years with Nyngan High School.

This year we have had a focus on a number of priority areas. Literacy, Numeracy, Aboriginal Education, Technology, Teacher Quality, Creative and Performing Arts, Sport, Academic achievement and High expectations.

We have continued to introduce changes as a way to move forward and improve the education and social outcomes of all of our students.

Academically we have had some tremendous success. Two students (Tom Waterhouse and Luke Wye)began in the regional virtual selective school xsel, Zara Hoare, Caitlyn Willcockson, Emerson Alderson and Bethany Young were selected to participate in the IXTEND gifted and talented program, our school introduced enrichment classes for gifted students and opportunity classes for students who required additional support. We had some fantastic results in NAPLAN and we continue to move our students' at above state average growth across a number of aspects of literacy and numeracy. We have participated in a range of academic competitions including Mathematics and English competitions along with the State Science and Engineering Challenge. A number of our HSC students have received offers of early entry to University and we have been involved in using and running senior Physics through a blended learning model including the use of video conferencing for students at our school and in Cobar. Our School Certificate results were released late last week and many of our students have performed exceptionally well.

We have also continued to succeed across a range of sporting arenas. Student representation in regional and state swimming, athletics, cricket, lawn bowls, netball, rugby league, soccer, basketball and touch football to name but a few. We participated in many local and regional sporting competitions and continued to achieve success through the dedication of our students and our staff.

We introduced a Creative and Performing Arts Program into the school under the leadership of Mrs Hunt and Miss Roots. In just one short year we have had student representation in Dance and drama camps, participated in the Schools Spectacular, opened the Regional Launch of Education week, formed a number of new bands within the school including our school band "rewind" and concert and instrumental band, participated in the Vibe Alive music festival, the Moorambilla arts festival, produced a musical involving students from across all of our partner primary schools, performed in a number of community events and had students selected for the state Drama team.

We finally took ownership of two state of the art trade training centres in Hospitality and Metals and Engineering and finished off our capital works programs in Science and school refurbishment. We have a school that would rival many private and government schools across Australia and it is our community and our students who will receive the benefits of such a wonderful investment by the community of Nyngan and the State and Federal Governments.

In 2011, we continued to develop our teaching staff with a focus on teacher quality and providing access to the very best educational opportunities for our students each and every day. We will continue to make this a focus in 2012 and beyond. It is my belief that we have the capacity to offer every student the best educational experiences in Western NSW and beyond and it is the focus of everything that we do. Your children are why we are here and it is the support of our parent and community body which makes Nyngan High School such a special place to work.

We continued to offer students the chance to attend leadership camps and school cultural exchanges. Our Year 7 students and Year 10 peer support leaders spent a week in Burrendong, our SRC representatives travelled to Wambangalang to participate in leadership workshops, our Year 11 students participated in the Crossroads program at Lake Keepit and six lucky students had the trip of a lifetime to China as part of our sister school exchange in Tongling. We were also fortunate enough to host our Chinese friends in November this year and show them just how lucky we are to have what we have in Nyngan.

We place a great deal of time and effort into supporting the welfare of all of our students and continued to teach our students the values and ethos of our school. I have the highest expectations of students and staff and will continue to do so for as long as our community wants me to lead this amazing school. Our staff are the backbone to every one of the outstanding programs that we offer. We all sacrifice time with our family for the benefit of our students. ## Girl's Choice University week

This year, four Nyngan High school students were accepted to attend the annual Girls Choice University program, Emma Beetson, Abbi-Lee Parry, Briana Wardman and Shannon Doyle were accompanied by Mrs Underwood to Newcastle University. Miss Underwood devotedly lived with and followed the girls around the campus, as they experienced many different facets of University life. The Girls' Choices Summer School is for female students in Year 9 and is designed to help build upon their potential to study maths and science subjects in Years 11 and 12.

The week began with a lecture titled 'Reach for the Stars', and a rare glimpse of Moon rocks which were on loan to Newcastle University from NASA. The rocks are the only ones outside of the United States of America. It was a privilege to hold such rare and valuable objects whilst also being aware of the two burly security guards who accompanied the rocks.

The First day ended with a challenge to create wearable art out of recycled materials. Each dorm of girls had to create a garment for a fashion show and nominate a model and a speaker from the group to present their artwork. After many deliberations Shannon Doyle graciously accepted the challenge as model and Briana bravely stepped forward to offer her skills as a presenter for the group. Both girls exceeded their own expectations of themselves and successfully fulfilled their role in the show. Tired and exhausted we went to bed eagerly anticipating the following days. Tuesday began with DNA testing and a Crime Scene investigation which was resolved by the girls in the Science laboratory. The girls followed the same procedure used by forensic scientists to uncover the identity of a suspect, from skin found under the victim's fingernails. The day ended with dinner at the Aboriginal building called 'Wollotuka'. After a sausage sizzle the girls were entertained with traditional Aboriginal dances. The girl's enjoyed the dances; they were passed down through many generations and hold deep cultural significance for the dancers and his family. The dancers were lively, creative and humorous as well as giving the girls at the program their first sight of a boy for a few days which became a performance in itself.

The Girls Choice program offers students the opportunity to be exposed to subjects, which they may not have heard of, thought that they were interested in or even capable of. Abbi-Lee Parry volunteered to have an ultrasound performed on her during the Physiotherapy lecture, the girls enjoyed the Chemical Engineering lecture, experimenting with the outcome of aerated sand and making Hydrogen propelled cars.

There were opportunities explored off campus as well. A tour of Port Waratah Coal, an RTA road construction tour and a return to nature with animal life drawing and sightseeing at Blackbutt reserve. An opportunity to explore the beach was not going to be missed by the Nyngan girls and when others retreated to the bus because of high winds, bluebottles and rain, our girls enthusiastically embraced the opportunity to naturally exfoliate their feet by running in the water and sand.

The week ended with a Girls only disco, exceeding their expectations and declaring that they had an "awesome time at the best ever disco Miss."

The Girls Choices program catered for many different requirements from Science, Mathematics, Self-Esteem, Self-Defence, goal setting and socialising skills. The Nyngan girls contributed and benefited from the program in many different and individual ways. They proudly represented Nyngan High School, Abby-Lee telling every lecturer that they were from Nyngan. It was an absolute privilege to be involved in the Girls Choices programs for 2011 and watch the growth of our students who continue to strive and develop into independent learners and successful young adults.
