Acting Principal Report

Core Value: "Do your best"

I expect the Homework Centre will start to be very busy next week as students access teachers help.

Year 11

Mrs Walsh has talked with every Year 11 student about their subjects going into the HSC year. It is very important that students take their studies seriously. The Board of Studies requires principals to have evidence that a student has:

- Followed the course
- Applied themselves with diligence and sustained effort to the set tasks and experiences provided in the course by the school
- Achieved all or some of the course outcomes.

Students who do not do the above risk an N Determination (non-completion of course). It is very hard to do any of those things listed if you are absent more than 85% of the time so attending school every day is very important.

Students who are withdrawing from various courses, instead of attending classes at that time, have study periods. During study periods students are expected to be working in the library or on their major works etc, by arrangement with their teachers and after notifying Ms Booth.

Students who do not have a class in period 1 are allowed to arrive and sign into school, via the front office at 9.45am (at the latest). Students who do not have a class in period 5 are allowed to sign out via the front office at lunchtime.

Year 12 is a challenging but very enjoyable time for students as they are now working towards our core value of "Do Your Best".

The Partners in Learning parent feedback survey closes Friday!!!!

The *Partners in Learning* parent survey, another part of the *Tell Them From Me* suite of surveys (student, teacher and parent surveys) on student engagement closes this Friday. The survey asks parents and carers questions about different factors that are known to impact on student wellbeing and engagement.

Running this survey will help Nyngan High School understand parents' and carers' perspectives on their child's experience at school. These include: communication between parents/carers and staff, activities and practices at home and parent/carer views on the school's support of learning and behaviour. This valuable feedback will help our school make practical improvements.

The survey is conducted entirely online at home or on public computers. The survey will typically take 15 minutes or less to complete and is completely confidential. The parent survey will be conducted between 22 August and 21 October. Participating in the survey is entirely voluntary, however, your responses are very much appreciated.

Deputy Principal Report

Term 4 is upon us and as we embark on an end of year rush, it is important to stop and reflect on our busy lives and not to forget those around us. This term can be very stressful for both staff and students and it can be easy to lose sight of what is truly important. To help counteract these times our Positive Education focus is Kindness. Scientific studies have shown that kindness has a great number of physical and emotional benefits and that children require a healthy dose of kindness in order to flourish as healthy, happy, well-rounded individuals. As do adults.

Kindness is a natural anti depressant because it causes a release of serotonin in our brain. Serotonin plays an important part in learning, memory, mood, sleep, health and digestion. It heightens our sense of well being, increases energy and gives a wonderful feeling of positivity and self worth.

In a famous study undertaken by Dr Sonja Lyubomirsky, Professor, University of California, students were asked to commit five random acts of kindness a week for six weeks. They showed a 41.66% increase in happiness. Kindness is so simple yet sometimes forgotten and this term we tend to commit as many of these acts as possible.

This week in workshops, students will brainstorm ideas on how they can act kindly in different situations. During our final term of 2016, we will run a random acts of kindness for all students to be involved in. Staff participated in this last term and received many goodies, including coffee vouchers, beverages and books.

Science News

Term 4 is shaping up to be quite busy.

During Week 4 when Stage 4 will be sitting their end of year exams, Year 8 students will also be undertaking the mandatory online VALID test. Validation of Assessment 4 Learning and Individual Development. Some people may remember this test as ESSA (Essential Science Skills Assessment). VALID is conducted in Years 6, 8 and 10 and provides a similar function to NAPLAN. Year 8 parents will receive a letter later this week regarding VALID.

Year 8 students in the Enrichment and Opportunity classes will be going online on Wednesday 2nd November during Period 1 and the Achievement and Discovery classes on Thursday 3rd November during Period 1. Time will be spent in science classes over the next few weeks completing past questions to prepare students. Year 7 students will also have the opportunity to become familiar with the VALID test format. All Stage 4 and 5 Science tests have been set in the same format as VALID, though on paper rather than online, and we use the same marking system resulting in students being comfortable with this form of assessment.

Stage 4 Guided Research Projects

The last 4 weeks of Term 3 saw Stage 4 students undertaking the Guided Research Project in which students use the investigation and research skills studied in science to undertake a group research task. This year we investigated solar energy. Individual groups selected a research question and designed experiments using our solar panel kits to formulate conclusions about their aspect of solar energy. Students then published their projects in the form of a magazine article using Excel spreadsheets to record data and produce graphs and then Publisher to create an interesting presentation. Although most lessons in class were dedicated to the projects, students who utilised time outside class were able to complete a more professional presentation.

The water containers can weigh up to 20 kilograms when full, which over time leads to injury and poor quality of life.

The Opportunity class with Mrs Lupton have taken action during Poverty Awareness Week to raise awareness about the impact of poverty in the world. The students decided on their own merit to have a donation jar at the canteen and a gold coin collection during DEAR. Stage 4 should be very proud of their efforts and the empathy they have shown towards others in need.

Stage 5 HSIE with Mr Miles and Miss Rixon are learning about the influences of pop culture in Australia. We have begun the unit of work listening to some sweet tunes from days gone by, such as Elvis, The Supremes, Beach Boys as well as some modern day movers and shakers such as Beyonce, Brittany Spears, Nelly and the Backstreet Boys - who would have thought this was History? 
Didgeridoo Workshop




Junior Fiction
