
Thank you for 2017




Maths/CAPA

Welcome to Week 8 and what a fortnight it has been for the students and staff of the Maths/CAPA faculty.

The puzzle last week was:

Jim and Amy found their way through a maze. When they finally reached the exit, they found the door was tightly shut. Beside the door was a note that said, "The door will open if you can tell – in 1 minute or less – what the 20^{th} shape will be in each pattern. "Jim and Amy had a look and drew the 20^{th} shape for each pattern. Then the door opened automatically and they got out of the maze.

Work out the 20^{th} shape on each line to see if you could get out of the maze too.



How did you go with it? The solutions were: a circle in the first, a diamond (or a rhombus as us mathematicians like to call it) for the second and a smiley face for the third.

There are 24 birds sitting on 3 trees. After 4 birds fly from the first tree to the second tree and 5 birds fly from the second tree to the third tree, the number of birds on each tree becomes the same.

Science/Learning Support

It has been a busy fortnight around the school with plenty happening!

Firstly a huge congratulations to Leah Bailey has been recognised for her excellence in science at a presentation in Dubbo last Wednesday. Leah was one of just 33 students to receive an award from the Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute, which recognises the efforts of students who reach a high level and display passion for science. Students travelled to Dubbo from as far east as Lithgow, as far west as Cobar and as far north as Lightning Ridge for the ceremony. Miss Strong also travelled to the ceremony and was on hand to congratulate Leah on her award.

Named after the late cardiac surgeon and pioneer of modern heart transplantation, the awards aim to foster development and encourage future generations to carry on Victor Chang's legacy. Dr Ralph Patrick from the institute was on hand to present the awards and said he was impressed with the talent in Western NSW. As well receiving the prestigious award, winning students were also extended an invitation to join more than 200 other students from across NSW on a tour of the Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute in Sydney. The Institute is dedicated to finding cures for cardiovascular disease and discoveries made have already saved lives.

Science classes have been taking the opportunity of this post exam period to work on skills and problem solving activities. Both Stage 4 and 5 have been involved in STEM projects, such as bridge building and egg drop challenges. Students have been very much enjoying the freedom to think outside the box and test their skills.







Northern Schools Prime Stock Competition

Tuesday last week the cattle team packed up and headed to Manilla, accompanied by Mrs Emma Partridge and Mr Mark Keighran to participate in the Northern Schools Prime Stock Competition. 240 students from 14 different schools were participating with 60 head of cattle, so Manilla Showground suddenly became a very busy place for the three days.

The seven Year 7 and 8 students have been working towards this competition since August, breaking in, training and preparing their animals. Each student competed in the paraders class, all handing such a large event well given their level of experience.

The junior judging was the event which the Nyngan Cattle Team excelled in. They had to assess a class of steers as if they were the judge and also answer some questions relating to the Prime Cattle Industry. In the year7/8/9 judging class there were over 100 competitors. Of which only 8 students progressed to the finals where they had to speak on why they placed their animals as they did. Jaidyn Wherritt and Mia Taylor were both successful in reaching the final 8 with Jaidyn narrowly missing out on a place. Congratulations to Mia and Jaidyn on this fantastic result. On receiving the final scores Jayden Robb, Jack Gadsby, Tom Gadsby and Brendan Waterhouse were all 1 mark off reaching the finals, which is a great result for their first steer competition.

In the evening the students enjoyed showing off their skills racing the other schools in a farmers' challenge, which was also an entertaining spectators sport for those on the sideline!

On the final day the steers were judged. Both steers were in the heavy weight domestic class. They both met the market specification, however our Shorthorn cross steer would have been more competitive if he had a little longer on feed. The Angus cross steer was in fantastic shape and the judge took a long time to select the winner, we were very excited to be placed 2^{nd} in a very strong line up.

The good byes were then said and the cattle were trucked to Bindaree Beef in Inverell. The carcasses were judged on Monday morning and we are now anxiously waiting to hear the results of this part of the competition.

The students were a pleasure to take away and really embraced the experience. They should be proud of their achievements and are already planning for next years' competition which will be hosted by the Inverell High Schools.

• The results of the carcass phase of the Northern Schools Prime Stock Comp. are in and we are very excited to learn that our Angus Cross Steer was awarded first place and the Shorthorn Cross Steer was awarded fifth place, both in the heavy weight domestic class. This is a fantastic result for the school against a very good line up of cattle.


University Visit

English News

Year 10 Enrichment have had a very productive 2017 in History and Geography. We have taken on many enjoyable challenges and some interesting topics such as WWI and WWII, Human Wellbeing and Rights and Freedoms 1945- present.

The Human Wellbeing topic is part of the new Geography curriculum which involved learning about global issues, role of the United Nations and the development of countries. We learnt that a more equitable way to measure a countries development is through wellbeing rather than only the gross domestic product (money) a country earns per year. This was a very interesting and different way of looking at the world which opened up excellent class discussion.

Below is an example of Year 10's favourite activity from the Human Wellbeing topic 'A Recipe for Happiness' and feedback about their learning this year in History and Geography.
