

I was very pleased to attend the morning tea with the NSW Governor alongside our School Captains and Mrs Bush. It was a lovely way in which to meet community members and our Captains spoke with the Governor at length on a range of issues.

I have been getting to know the students over the last few weeks and will endeavour to know as many names as possible by the end of the year. We have handed out the HSC Assessment booklets for Year 12 2020 and we are straight into preparing our students for the rigours of the HSC for 2020. Students are well aware of their requirements and the opportunities they have coming up in the next 12 months.

I look forward to meeting and speaking with in the coming weeks, months and years. Please come in and see me or stop me for a chat if we cross paths.

#### HSC NATIONAL MINIMUM STANDARDS

Students are required to sit tests of reading, writing and maths for everyday life. Students get two chances a year to pass each of the tests from Year 10 until a few years after the HSC.

If your student passes the online tests of basic reading, writing and numeracy skills they will show they've met the HSC minimum standard.

The standard is set at level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF), which means students will have the basic reading, writing and maths skills needed for everyday tasks and future learning after school. It includes skills for tasks such as:

- following safety instructions in equipment manuals
- understanding a mobile phone plan
- writing a job application
- creating a personal weekly budget

Students in Years 10 and 11 who need to sit the online HSC National Minimum Standard testing will be able to attempt the tests between Week 4 to Week 6. Students will need to contact the coordinator to organise a time and nomination for the testing. They will also need to download a lockdown browser onto their device, or alternatively use one of the pre-downloaded school devices.

As a school we would encourage all students in Year 10 and 11 who are required to sit the testing to do so this term in order to get a clear idea of how they are going moving into 2020.

We sincerely thank Rosemary Davis, Director, Arts, Sports and Initiatives for this very kind offer.



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

#### Aboriginal Education Report

This year, the Nyngan High School Aboriginal Education Team have designed and created a logo that represents Aboriginal Education at our school. Using LOTE classes, students were given the task of designing their own logos.

Ideas from Ethan Eckhart, Shannon Bourke, Dan Kennedy and Sonny Knight were combined, and elements of their designs incorporated into the new logo. We also looked at all the other designs and upon seeing a common theme, realised that all students have had their designs represented.



The logo was designed to tell the story of the school, a central meeting place of learning represented by the circles. The blue lines that lead to the school represent foot tracks. The notion of leaving the school as bigger and better human beings is represented by the larger blue lines and the orange wavy lines representing a path. The accompanying words Wangaaypuwan meaning Wongaibon; the traditional owners of this land and Thiipikarri (our garden) meaning to know/to learn knowledge.

You will be seeing this logo on correspondence and information relating to Aboriginal Education in future at Nyngan High School.

**Stage 5** are studying equations including solving algebraic fractions, binomial expansions and inverse operations. The semester exams for Stage 5 are: 5MAO and 5MAA are on **Tuesday November 5<sup>th</sup>**, 5MAV is on **Wednesday November 6<sup>th</sup>** and 5MAE is on **Thursday November 7<sup>th</sup>**.

All Stage 4 and 5 classes will be doing some revision in class but the responsibility lies with the student. Ways in which they can revise the content is from using their books, past in class test and utilising Mathletics.

Year 11 are settling nicely into their new classes for the HSC year and by all accounts are working very hard and completing homework.

Best wishes are extended to Year 12 who sit Mathematics Standard 2 on Friday from 9:20 to 12:00, Mathematics on the same day from 1:55 to 5:00 and Mathematics Extension 1 on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> November from 9:25 to 11:30. We hope your diligence and commitment pays off.


