After a few snack stops, we arrived at the centre at 10.30am for a Police Liaison presentation about safe driving, this was followed by a drug and alcohol information session. After all that heavy business, we slipped and slid the afternoon away, Maverick and Adrian winning the awards for most enthusiastic slip and slide participants for sure. After some night sports in the activity hall and some practical advice for looking after each other at parties, the gang was well and truly ready for bed.

On Thursday, we enjoyed an extensive canoeing session on Lake Burrendong, which is looking much fuller and greener than our previous visit for Peer Support, so this was a treat indeed. We played a number of team building games in the canoe, even directing each other on the lake while blindfolded. This set them up nicely for some raft building challenges by the pool. That afternoon, students engaged in a seminar delivered by nurses from Dubbo Sexual Health. After this big day, the girls opted out of anything too strenuous for their free-time and got 'party ready', turning the cabins into beauty salons, for all the hair, brow and tanning needs of their peers. That evening they requested not to get too sweaty (so as not to disrupt the fake tanning process) and opted for trivia which was organised by Burrendong staff. This got incredibly heated, and while there may not have been any sweat, I feared it might end with blood or tears! Special shout-out must go to Will whose knowledge of big icons in NSW got his team the win at the very end.

On Friday, we started the day with combat archery, again putting students' teamwork skills to the test and exposing the ruthless and competitive streaks in the cohort. After some fun in the combat zone, we moved down for the final seminar. This was delivered by Headspace Dubbo, reminded students how to identify if they are suffering from poor mental health, and gave some practical strategies for resilience, hugely important stuff as they move towards the HSC.

After a relaxing drive home (and pits stop at the much anticipated sushi train), we returned home tired and hopefully having learnt some important skills for Year 12 and beyond.

As the year draws to a close, we farewell Miss Mason and wish her all best for the next placement.


We also say goodbye to Mrs Hamblin, as she takes a leave for 2021. We hope she has a wonderful, well deserved break with family.

### An exciting opportunity for Nyngan High School

Earlier this year I submitted an application for a grant to purchase technology. The main reasoning behind the application was to support our Principal and Executive in their drive to increase the skillset of our girls, and to provide interesting, authentic projects that make a positive difference in our community.

At this stage the projects have yet to be refined, but loosely speaking we were hoping to engage a group of our Stage 5 Aboriginal students to work with Mr Kunkel to learn all there is to learn about drones and what opportunities these amazing little flying machines can offer. We will be in touch with the Land's Council to see if there are any chances for collaboration. A press release from the Northern Land Council explains the forum was mainly focused on bio-security, with Indigenous rangers set to be recognized as conservation officers due to changes in the Territory Parks and Wildlife Conservation Act 1976.

Nicholas Hunter, a ranger from Mardbalk explained using drones would allow them to save time and help with general safety. Nicholas also said that drones will be able to protect sacred sites along with ceremony grounds.

Barrow joined Deebank and he too scored at a decent clip. Unfortunately, NHS lost regular wickets and although Cooper Black hit a couple of massive bombs and Gudgeon batted sensibly, they were all out for 135 in the 37<sup>th</sup>. ### U/15's Boys Touch Football Report

Nyngan High School's under 15's boys travelled to Orange last Tuesday to contest the prestigious COVID-19 Western Touch Football Carnival.

The overnight stay saw spirits high but confidence middling once the boys saw that their pool contained the might of Blayney, Parkes, Dunedoo and Mudgee, much larger schools and notorious touch football powerhouses.

First cab off the rank was Blayney who tried to intimidate the boys by warming up in front of them. It worked initially, but once Coach Tulenew showed them a tactic that he said has worked since the halcyon days of the 80's, the boys were up and about and ready to dominate.

The final pool game saw Nyngan emerge victorious 4-2 over an outclassed Dunedoo side and make the semi-finals. Will Black again starred in this one and scored two long rage pearlers, whilst Tyson Deebank was also a superstar and held the middle well all game long.

The semi-final saw Nyngan face Canobolas High, a well-drilled side with plenty of skill, pace and confidence. Our boys again started slow but eventually bounced back in what was a nail-biting encounter throughout. Hot and uncomfortable conditions greeted the students and ensured that whilst it was a day of fun, it wouldn't be that fun. The Nyngan High School under 14's boys took on their Bourke counterparts in the first game and dominated throughout. The 16's girls conquered their Cobar rivals 8-0 in a game dominated by Millie Smith at fullback and Brooke Bunting, who played one of the best debut games you will see. Serenity Sheather, Jaynie Smith and Abbie Smith were their usual brilliant selves as well. Bourke were too scared to play after watching this game and forfeited due to a combination of low numbers, heat and fear.


### Mr Kunkel reports:
