Principal's Report

Welcome back to Term 3. It has been a little different to the way in which we began Term 2; working in isolation, teaching remotely and going square-eyed looking into screens for hours and hours each day. That said, as events in Sydney, on the south coast and in many parts of Victoria have demonstrated, COVID-19 is still very much an issue for Australians everywhere. This term we are looking at ways in which we can conduct a range of our normal curricular and extra- curricular activities, while meeting restrictions. Activities such as our regular Term 3 offerings like the HSC subject information for Year 10, sporting events and examinations are currently being reviewed. We are also in discussions on 'where to next' in the planning for the Year 12 end of year activities and formal. Clear information will be shared with the community in the coming week. The planning and, where possible, the delivery will occur, dependent upon the advice received from NSW Health and the Department of Education. Achievement

The Semester One academic reports were distributed to students during school time at the end of Term 2. If you haven't received your child's as yet, they are waiting in the front office. Unlike previous years and as a result of continuing restrictions on adult gatherings in response to the Coronavirus pandemic health issue, community members cannot be invited to attend assemblies to acknowledge achievement, we will continue to post videos and presentations online at this stage. With luck, we may be able to return to more public ceremonies at the end of Semester Two.

Sporting Opportunities

This term we will be running the cross country and Athletic carnival events, however we will be doing so in line with restrictions. These events will not be run in the regular carnival format, rather being run during school time and students needing to nominate for events. Unfortunately, spectators are not allowed and you can not watch your child participate. Students are encouraged to participate as they will be able to qualify for records and also count towards sportsperson of the year. This will start with Wednesday; Week 3 the Cross Country being run.

Unfortunately, I have to give a reminder and ask for parental and community support on a few issues. Welcome back to Term 3. It has been an excellent first week and I was reminded of how collegial and positive our Nyngan high School team is. Our staff are focused on supporting students' literacy and numeracy progressions and we have started to work in the area of trauma informed practice to ensure we are skilled to support all of our students. We will be sharing some of these strategies with families as we progress in our training as they can be very beneficial in the parenting sphere also.

This term encapsulates major exam weeks for Years 11 and 12, the culmination of HSC Major Projects and Performances and his looks very different to previous years due to the nature of COVID and the second wave of cases continuing to rise. Year 12 festivities and farewell assembly are currently being discussed and negotiated to determine best course of action. We will keep you updated in this process. This term sees us planning for 2021 and we will hold subject selections for current Years 8 and 10 students in the coming week. The end of the term is also the end of the preliminary HSC courses for Year 11 students; a busy and exciting term.

In Week 3, Year 10 students will be making subject choices for the senior years. This is a wonderful time to choose subjects you enjoy and are good at. Maths/CAPA News

The Maths/CAPA faculty welcomes Mr Veikko Kunkel who returns to Nyngan High School after a 14 year holiday! He is teaching Stage 5 Achievement for Mathematics, is our TRS and lives in the Maths/CAPA staffroom.

Stage 4 are finishing the topic Patterns and Algebra and starting on the new topic Angles. So far they have learned how to label and angle and use a protractor, which is not an easy skill.

Stage 6 Advanced are working on continuous probability distributions and introduction to calculus. Max and Jordan always work collaboratively and with perseverance and Fira is an extremely dedicated student; three common traits for successful students.

Stage 6 Dance has been notified the practical HSC examination will take place on August 19^{th} and the HSC markers will be in the school from 9:00 - 12:15. We wish Saranna and Caroline all of the best for their upcoming performances.

Stage 4 Music have begun a new unit in music, 'Aussie Rock'. They are well on their way to becoming rock legends by learning new skills on the guitar.

Stage 5 Music also have begun a new unit 'Aussie Bush Music'. They are learning about ballads and prominent Australian poets and bush singers.

Stage 6 Music will have their practical HSC examination in the following time period Monday 7 September and Friday 18 September 2020, but we will receive the specific date on August 19th.

Stage 4 Art are learning about the frames. In particular this week they have learnt about the structural frame and the artist's application of line, colour and shape along with the use of signs and symbols to imply meaning. They have been photoshopping animals in preparation for Lino carving.

Stage 5 Art are also learning about the frames. They are developing questions which prompt them to look deeper into artworks to understand the artist's intentions.

Stage 6 Art are in preparation for their trial and yearly examinations. They have been using the HSC HUB to "Join the dots" between content areas.

Stage 5 Photography are developing storylines and character profiles for stop motion animations.

They have each come up with interesting topics which they are researching and developing points of view on. A **huge shout out to Amber and Reagan** who have been the first brave students to interview staff and students. Thank you to everybody who has agreed to be interviewed, you are appreciated.

Now add that number to its reverse and you get 396+693=1089.



Science/Special Education

Welcome to Term Three! It's great to see everyone back and ready for another term.

The Special Ed team spent part of the staff development day last week developing some new resources and teaching strategies to be used in the MC unit, which is being rolled out across this term. After only the first week it was exciting to see how these students were responding to the new activities and already acquiring some new skills, I'll look forward to sharing their progress in the coming weeks.

Stage 4 Science have continued to learn about the properties and uses of rocks with interesting case studies on Cleopatra's Needle in New York and why the Hieroglyphics have been fading. The students have used their prior learning of chemical and physical weathering to come up with hypotheses which they have then tested by creating their own scratching in chalk. This has also extended their interest into other uses rocks over time with some students researching aboriginal rock use for tools, buildings and agriculture.

Stage 5 Science are now looking at Evolution and Natural Selection. The students have loved the simulation of natural selection with piece of paper and which tools worked best for selecting their food source. The tongs had a much higher survival rate than forks and spoons it would appear!

iSTEM have been extending their skills with coding and using the OZbots. I would like to wish them luck for the Game Changer competition which they were so successful in last year. This year due to COVID-19, they have put together an outstanding video submission, so fingers crossed and watch this space to see if they have been successful in advancing to the next level.

Term Three is pretty important for our **Stage 6 Students**, with both Year 11 and Year 12 nearing the end of their courses and assessment. They have started the term with their eye on the ball and I wish them all well for their last term.

Lots of exciting things are planned for this term and I look forward to sharing more news from our faculty in the next couple of weeks!

TAS FACULTY

Great to be back and see our students participate in Saturday sport again.

The TAS faculty is off and running this term with both students and teachers keen to get involved.

This term our industrial technology classes will focus on the industrial revolution and how technology has impacted our timber and metal industries. Students will complete associated theory projects which will be a fold up picnic table for timber and folding BBQ which will see them continue to develop a range of practical skills throughout the term. Some of these projects are starting to look impressive and our students are to be commended for their attention to detail and eagerness to extend their skills.

In material technologies our Year 7/8 students will be exploring the characteristics of timber as a resource in the manufacturing of furnishing products. They will work through the design process to produce a quality final storage device aimed at developing their woodworking skills

throughout the term. They will also explore the role of an Engineer and the contributions of innovative design on our society.

Stage 6 Exploring Early Childhood will be starting off Term 3 with a look at 'Young Children and the Media'. Students will be looking at the way in which media influences young children in Australia, especially through television, magazines, video games and Internet access and the impact on their lives.

Year 11 Hospitality will continue to look at aspects of WHS and food safety and will reflect these procedures during practical classes. Practical classes will see them undertake practical assessment tasks in which they will need to prepare a three-course meal using the skills they have learned through-out semester one.

Stage 5 Food Technology will be looking at 'Food for Specific Needs', which will include low-fat, high- dietary fibre foods, vegetarian and gluten-free foods. Their practicals will be based on these specific-needs and dietary requirements for teenagers. They will also investigate KETO and PALEO eating and the advantages and disadvantages of each.

Stage 5 Child Studies will be continuing their studies starting off with 'Caring for a Newborn' and how important it is to provide a safe, loving and supportive environment to bring a baby up in. They will be reflecting on how having a newborn in the house impacts on various aspects of personal and family life, financial and social adjustments, and emotional wellbeing.

Stage Four Mandatory Technology Textiles will be creating small samples of work as they learn to use a sewing machine and investigate fabric decoration techniques to enhance their design projects. Students will also learn about the role of designers and the Design Process.

Throughout this term SLR will be looking at how technology has impacted on participation and performance in sport. This week we compared 100m World Records over the past 50 years and analysed how these improvements have been made.

PASS will be working on a unit called Australia's Sporting Identity. This week we investigated the role that sport has played in shaping our national identity. **Prelim PDHPE** are starting their first option - Fitness Choices. This week we examined the fitness needs of individuals and communities. **HSC PDHPE** are continuing with their last option - Improving Performance. This week we concentrated on the planning considerations for improving performance.

In CAFS, the HSC students are finishing off their option module of Individuals and Work which explores the rights and responsibilities of employees and employers and requires students to identify and assess the effectiveness of employee policies and government laws in relation to the protection of Australian workers. Prelim are beginning their last module of the Year 11 course Families and Communities. Here students delve into family structures and community organisations on a local, state and global level.

Stage 5 PDHPE have began the topic Do I or Don't I? Students are looking into respectful relationships, sexual health education and the negatives of risk taking with drugs. Stage 4 PDHPE are learning to be positive Australian citizens and health consumers by exploring health options and nutrition to keep themselves and their friends healthy. Both Stage 4 and 5 PDHPE will be completing the SpikeZone program in the practical Component of the course, learning and refining skills in Volleyball.

My Primary Industries class will concentrate on completing their work associated with handling animals and then start the much-loved unit of fencing. They will become experts at tying knots and working with mesh. I have been fortunate enough to get the class accepted into a TAFE course Farm Vehicle Safety Program to be held in Nyngan at no cost. This will see the students become competent in riding both two and four-wheel motorbikes.

Stage 5 Agriculture are completing their unit on Wheat and looking forward to working on the vegetable plots. We will also be putting the greenhouse to good use with learning new skills.





I am currently busy with Year 12 organising them ready to face the big world and assisting Year 10 students make decisions about their future direction.

Congratulations to Kayne Smith on starting his Certificate II in Agriculture through a School Based Traineeship with Canonba Pastoral Co.

I hope everyone enjoyed the break and are ready for a jam-packed term. Stay safe.




When rain turns to snow by Jane Godwin
