Science/Special Education

After the success of Science week, we have launched a Science Club at Nyngan High School, with our first session running during Tuesday lunch. We had a small number of budding scientist who attended with the challenge of using nothing but air to crush a can! They enjoyed the experiment, successfully crushed some cans and learnt about air pressure and some laws of Physics, Mr Arnull also demonstrated a steam engine so that the students could explore how steam can be used to power motors. We look forward to this being a regular event, it's open to all students and will run every Week A, Tuesday lunchtime. All students are welcome.

In Stage 4 students have been learning about Classification and plants. These students have also had the privilege to be the first students to use the new microscopes which arrived last week and they have loved learning how to use them and getting up close to familiar objects.

Stage 5 are currently doing The Savage Earth unit, students have been learning about Tectonic plates, earthquakes and volcanos.

In Stage 6 our Year 12's have been receiving back their trial HSC results and are busy using these to improve their results and consolidate their learning in preparation for their HSC examinations. Year 11 Biology have been completing their final module on ecosystem dynamics, which has taken them to the river for some sampling and study of an aquatic environment. All of Year 11 are now revising in preparation for their end of course exams which are next week. We wish them the best of luck for these examinations.


The History of Mischief by Rebecca Higgie.


The Other Side of the Sky by Amie Kaufman and Megan Spooner


Two Worlds, two hearts and a choice that will shape their fate forever.

Ruby Tuesday by Hayley Lawrence


