This engagement will lead to true post school opportunities in the future and a more holistic experience in the present. Over the last fortnight our school has been humming along nicely, as we head towards the middle of Term 1 and our Mid-Term break. *A few highlights for me have been:*

- Having many teachers step into new leadership roles

- The presentation of our Student Representative Council and Junior AECG for 2021 on Monday's assembly

Lifelong learners

Evidence around the world shows that investing in leadership at all phases of a school leader's career will make a substantial difference to the quality of teaching and therefore the quality of student learning in our school. From the 18-19 February I had the pleasure of attending the SPC Principal conference in Mudgee. This conference provided engaging, relevant and significant professional learning. This included leading high quality teaching and learning across the school, enhancing student wellbeing strategies, and ensuring that in our school community every child is known, valued and cared for.

I was reminded of the importance of modelling lifelong learning to my staff and students. Conferences of this nature enable me to focus on quality teaching and leadership practices that have the greatest impact on teacher learning and therefore the outcomes of our students.

Yondr Pouch Implementation

On March 8th, Nyngan High School will be refreshing our understanding and usage of Yondr pouches to make our school a phone-free space to improve teaching and learning. The Yondr Program employs a simple, lockable pouch that stores a mobile phone. Every student will secure their phone in their personally assigned Yondr pouch when they arrive at school each morning. They will maintain possession of their phones, and will not use them until they are unlocked at the end of the school day. Students are required to bring their Yondr pouch to and from school each day and are responsible for their pouch at all times. In an effort to best serve your child, we appreciate your full support in the adoption of the Yondr Program at our school.

Community support

Further to Yondr pouches, we ask parents to communicate with their students during the day through the front office. We also ask that if you are intending on picking a student up early or giving permission for your student to leave that you record your reasons with the fantastic and helpful ladies in front office. We are also working through the logistics of running more activities at lunch to enable students to participate in activities that stimulate play and enjoyment during break times.

School Uniform

Our school has always set a very high standard with the wearing of school uniform. It is a wonderful feature of Nyngan High School and is something that visitors to our school always make positive comments about.

I will remind everyone that in 2021 students who are consistently out of uniform, without explanation, will not be allowed to represent the school or attend some excursions. This is a high expectation and I make no apologies for that. Where families require financial support for some items of school clothing, I am happy to negotiate and support those needs.

Raylene Weldon our Aboriginal Education Officer will be working to promote and organise cultural opportunities for our Aboriginal identifying students and their peers across a range of spaces. Raylene will continue to advise teachers on cultural protocols and work with Mr Casley leading SRC and junior AECG initiatives in the school. Richard Milligan will continue as a Chaplain and Youth Worker three days a week

and is taking on the Outdoor Education class as part of our Community Elective in Stage 5. Troy Richards will be working as a Community Liaison two days a week and continue to help students access opportunities, bridging any divides that may exist between home and school. He also regularly engages with Nyngan High School students through his role as a youth worker at Barnardos.

Raylene will continue to work from her office behind the English faculty, Ms Scott, Mr Milligan and Troy can be found in the new Wellbeing staffroom in Room 20 (next door to Science faculty). We are also working towards refurnishing Richard's old office into a new Wellbeing Hub (far corner near the Art room and container).

Ms Hughan, Mr Walsh, Neralie and Ms Rixon are also working on the Wellbeing Team as part of school planning meetings for Nyngan High School.

Wellbeing initiatives

Breakfast Club

For all new students and a reminder to returning students, Mr Milligan runs breakfast club every morning from 8am until the bell goes at 8.40. Students can make cereal, toast, milo, cups of tea or just pop in for a chat to start the day. All welcome and food provided by Nyngan High School.

Attendance Strategy

As part of the new School's Excellence Framework, the team are working together to improve attendance initiatives at Nyngan High School. We have a few ideas in the pipeline to reward students who work hard to attend regularly and do the right thing and some strategies to target those who are habitually late or have problematic attendance.

According to AITSL's Spotlight on Attendance;

- 25% of Australian school students attend less than 90% of school days this equates to approximately 20 or more days absent in a school year
- Attendance rates tend to decline in secondary school, from Year 8 onwards
- There is a notable attendance gap between Indigenous and non-Indigenous students, as well as between students from metropolitan and remote locations.



We understand last year was a difficult one and it certainly shows in our numbers, so we are asking parents to work with us to improve attendance rates across the school. Attendance at school and a strong routine are at the forefront of wellbeing and success in later life.

Rural Youth Mental Health Leadership Forum

Next week Shannon Bourke, Malakye Cubby, Meg Meldrum and Shania Dutschke will be off to Dubbo Convention Centre to attend the first ever Rural Youth Mental Health Leadership Forum, run by Headspace and Batyr. Nyngan High School is excited to be a part of this new project that recognises the importance of upskilling young people to support each other in areas of mental health. The aim of the program is to create school-based leaders who are approachable, non-judgemental and confident talking to their peers and helping them access mental health services in their school and broader community. The forum will discuss the notion that mental health exists on a continuum and hopefully give young people the knowledge and skills to bring this information back to their peers. Our student representatives will engage in service mapping in the area and devise wellbeing programs for the Nyngan High School community. This is a very exciting initiative, watch this space.

Support services available

There are a number of mental health support services that can be accessed through the Wellbeing Team at Nyngan High. Students are encouraged to seek advice from Year Advisors and trusted teachers if they are feeling as if they could use some extra support at school. *At the moment, the following support is available;*

At School

- -School Counsellor Lynda Pascoe is available at Nyngan High School each Wednesday.
- -Year Advisor support is available for students needing a chat or wanting to know their options.
- -The Learning Support Team, led by Ms Scott and Mr Walsh can help students access extra support and notify teachers of adjustments or support people that might assist students at school.

External Agencies

- -Rural Youth Mental Health Program run by youth worker Rebecca from Benevolent Society Orange, Rebecca visits each fortnight working on skills to build confidence, resilience and offers a new perspective outside the community.
- -Headspace Dubbo offers appointments via telehealth, these can be accessed through the Wellbeing Team. They can happen at school, or from the privacy of your home if you prefer.
- -Barnardos Nyngan offers youth worker support for individuals and family support in the community where needed
- -Child Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS) is available in Dubbo for more urgent mental health matters

As I say to students all the time, mental health is real health – if you had a broken leg you wouldn't just hobble around on it. Do not suffer in silence; there are things you can access if you are not feeling your best self. I am looking forward to a great year ahead leading Nyngan High School's Wellbeing team and initiatives.

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The *Education Act 1990* requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Trave

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.





My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and Communities may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

 Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

Application to the Children's Court
 Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department

may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education and Communities recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities. If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.

English / HSIE News

A belated welcome to 2021 to all. As the English/HSIE faculty gets into our rich and varied curriculum options, a trip around the grounds is an appropriate way to see what's going on in classrooms.

Stage 4 English has been investigating the experiences of children in World War 2 through a reading of the seminal Gleitzman novel 'Once'. By all reports the students are displaying a matured and considered approach to learning this topic and are building some crucial communication skills in the process.

Stage 4 History – Began their topic on Vikings in earnest and are developing their investigative and critical thinking skills looking at the lives of the Scandinavian plunderers. Mr Matheson's class used their understanding to create their own caricatures that look awesome on the back wall of Room 10.

First Nations texts are on the agenda for **Stage 5 English**, with a focus on Wayne Blair's excellent film The Sapphires. Students have hitherto been doing a context study, including guest speakers talking about life in missions and reserves for Aboriginal people. Again, the respect and maturity shown by the students has been a highlight for teachers.

World Wars are the topic for this term in **Stage 5 History** and the students got an opportunity to get a feel for life as a soldier in the Pacific during WWII on Wednesday.














Year 12 English Studies and Standard are wrapping up their study of Billy Elliot and have produced some outstanding work for their assessment tasks. Year 11 English Advanced and Standard are looking at a range of texts for the Reading to Write topic and Mr Partridge's Extension 1 have started their deconstruction of post-colonial texts.

Mia Taylor is ploughing through the **Modern History** course and the Year 11s are getting into some source analysis, developing skills integral to their studies. Fallon McClelland, over in **Society and Culture**, is researching the impact of digital screens on 3-5 year olds for her PIP.

Our **Senior Drama** students plough on, developing ideas for their individual projects as Year 11 looks at theatrical styles via Theatre of the Absurd and Greek Theatre.

Aboriginal Languages have been looking at some context for a study of the Ngiyampaa language and Year 7 students new to the game have been very vocal in their contributions to discussions around the importance and significance of learning the local language.

Our school DEAR groups have settled brilliantly and it is heart-warming to see a school quietly reading every morning. Reading for pleasure is truly one of life's great joys.

Stage 6 Preliminary Mathematics Standard have been issued their first Assessment Task, which is due 8:40 am Friday 19th March 2021.


Music News

News From The Art Room

Stage 4 have been using the elements of art to create portraits. So far they have learnt about shape and colour.

Stage 5 Art has been completing a drawing unit focusing on the restoration and disintegration of the natural environment. They drew en plein air style, sitting in the Aboriginal Garden and went on an excursion to the river to take source photographs for their drawings.

Year 11 art have been studying Picasso using the four frames; subjective, cultural, structural and postmodern. They have also learnt about the artmaking practice of Frank Auerback who strives to get perfection in his artworks by rubbing out or scraping back his pieces time and time again.

Year 12 are working on a case study "Art from the Past" while continuing to create their Body of Works. Photography students have been learning to use manual camera operations focusing on obtaining correct exposure and compositional techniques.



Welcome to 2021! Firstly I would like to introduce Mrs Julie Shilling to the team, she is teaching in our MC classes and comes to us from Narooma and welcome back to Mr Michael Walsh, also working in the MC classes and in the position of Learning and Support Teacher. Mr Walsh returns to us after a year of traveling and teaching overseas, it's lovely to have him back! Continuing in their previous roles in the faculty are, Mrs Cora Milligan in the MC classes, Mr Jarred Casley in Science, IT and Student Voice Co-ordinator, Mr David Arnull, who teaches Science and Maths and is the Year 7 Year Advisor and Mrs Partridge continues in her role as Head Teacher Science/Special Ed and teaching Science.

We have had a great start to the year, welcoming our new Year 7's to school. They are settling into their new routines well and are learning their way around the laboratories. Congratulations to all our students who achieved their Bunsen Burner licences last week! **Stage 4** have been learning about Scientific Methods, which is a great introduction topic for our new students to Science, while also allowing our returning students to brush up on their Science skills.

Stage 5 have returned to school full of energy, so in an attempt to focus their enthusiasm, they have been learning about Energy Transfer and are moving into Waves and the Electromagnetic Spectrum. They have definitely hit the ground running and are enjoying all the practical activities associated with this topic. Stage 5 can expect their first assessment task after mid-term break, which will be due at the end of term.

In Stage 6, we now have all three mainstream Sciences up and running, Mr Arnull has a Year 11 Physics class, which is great to see after a couple of years of Physics not running at Nyngan High School. I have already heard students commenting on how much they are enjoying the course! Mr Casley is teaching Year 11 and 12 Chemistry and Mrs Partridge Year 11 and 12 Biology.

The MC classrooms have continued with their room upgrades and facelift from last year, making Rooms 1 & 2 an inviting, comfortable and productive place for our MC students to learn and develop according to their individual needs. Students in Rooms 1 & 2 follow set timetables as do their mainstream peers, following a mix of mainstream and life skills outcomes according to each individual students' particular requirements. It pleasing to see some of our Stage 5 & 6 students doing work placement this year to assist in their transition from School to Work and a massive thank you to those employers who have taken on and are supporting our students.

Stage 5 students this year are involved in a Working in the Community project. I have the pleasure of accompanying the Year 10 each Thursday to the Museum and the Shearing Shed. The students are working in a number of different areas, assisting the volunteers in restoration and research tasks, depending on the student's various interests. These young ladies have jumped straight into this project and have been outstanding and even having the confidence to make their own suggestions of things which could be done to enhance the displays within the Museum. If anyone has any photo albums and rags which they would like to donate, the girls would greatly appreciate them for a task they are working on.




Tiger Daughter by Rebecca Lim

'Don't fear the labels.'




