Science/Special Ed

What a busy term we have had, it's hard to believe that Term 1 is coming to a close! The MC unit have had a fabulous start to the year, with some of our Stage 5 and Stage 6 students becoming involved in some work experience and work placement to create some post school pathways, along with some students transitioning into some main stream lessons. Across the whole MC unit it has been lovely to see all the students mixing and integrating with their peers in the playground and in other activities across the school such as sport, school rock band and harmony day activities. Well done to these students for regularly challenging themselves.

Stage 4 have become familiar and settled into the Science laboratories well, with all our new Year 7's achieving their Bunsen burner licences. They are now learning about Forces in class and this week have completed their first assessment task for the year. Well done to Stage 4 for their efforts, I have already heard that Mr Arnull and Mr Casley are very impressed with the quality of the work that students have submitted.

Stage 5 have continued to learn about waves, moving into the Electromagnetic Spectrum and uses of these waves in everyday life. Students have been particularly surprised to learn that microwaves are not just used for cooking and just how many types of waves are used in one little mobile phone! They too have completed their first assessment, producing a slide show suitable for a Stage 5 audience on some of these forms of radiation. Mr Arnull and I have been impressed with how diligently our students worked on this task.

Stage 6 have had a big term, with Year 12 Chemistry and Biology completing module 6 for their respective courses. Only two to go! Year 11 Chemistry, Physics and Biology have all settled into their new courses well, with the introductory work now under their belt, they are well into their syllabuses and have been doing lots of hands on investigations in the labs, building their Working Scientifically Skills. Well done to these students for stepping up to the increased work load of stage 6!

This week the Outback Science and Engineering Team which consisted of mostly Stage 5 students with a handful of Stage 4 students who stepped up at last minute to fill all the spaces in the team, travelled to Cobar to compete with a number of schools in the Western Region. The group were split up into teams to compete in a range of science and engineering challenges. Groups who were successful were not teams that knew the most about science and engineering but rather those who worked well in teams, and our lot were all fantastic in their groups.

Our Water Turbine teams were tasked with creating a water turbine that could spin the fastest. After a number of unsuccessful prototypes the team learnt from each experience managed to create a winning turbine by the end of the session. The group learnt to never let failure get in the way of making progress.

The seismic towers teams were tasked with creating a tower with a tall platform that could support a large amount of weight during a simulated seismic event. Much was learnt about how structures can use specific support to resist lateral movement. Other teams also participated in sending and decoding secret messages using light, connecting town using as little string as possible and managing a cities power grid using a range of renewable and non-renewable energy sources.

Some teams got to build bionic hands and others got to make hover crafts. The day ended with the final presentation which consisted of our bridge building team who worked all day on building a bridge to support an increasing amount of weight. All the schools bridges were tested at the end of day presentation where Nyngan High School performed very well.

At the end of the day our team managed to take home 2nd Place Champions Trophy, beaten only by Broken Hill with a handful of points.
