

To the girls surprise they qualified to swim at Homebush at the State CHS carnival. The girls continued to train till the pool closed, then they had to resort to dryland fitness and training, making it a huge challenge for them to maintain their swimming fitness.

They travelled to Sydney on Wednesday 28th April accompanied by Mrs Cath Healey and Mrs Emma Partridge, ready to swim early on Thursday morning at the Sydney Olympic Park Aquatic Centre.

On arrival they were presented with their Western Regional Representative swimming caps before being taken down stairs to marshal. The girls were in the 2^{nd} heat of three and while they weren't fast enough to make the finals, they all swam personal bests to beat their qualifying time from Dubbo by almost 7 seconds, which was a fantastic result, particularly considering that they hadn't been in a pool for over two weeks.

Afterwards the girls enjoyed looking at the Olympic memorabilia within the aquatic centre and generally took in the whole experience, including watching some of the CHS diving which was beside the warm up pool and amazing to see live.

Maths CAPA news

Week 5 and Week 6 are exams for Stage 5, and Week 6 and Week 7 are exams for Stage 4. Students need to be revising for their classes. Students should also come to exams prepared with the correct equipment, such as calculators for mathematics.

Stage 4 Mathematics are currently looking at percentages, and how to convert percentages to decimals and fractions.

Stage 5 Mathematics have been looking at trigonometry, with an excursion by the 5O and 5E classes to the town's water tower to find its height using trigonometry. Through measuring the angle of elevation, and using the distance from the base of the water tower, it was found to be approximately 28 metres tall.

Stage 6 Preliminary Standard Mathematics have recently started a new topic "earning and managing money". There will be a test on this topic in Week 9 this term.

Stage 6 HSC Standard Mathematics are currently preparing for their Task 2 Assessment, which will be on Networks.

<u>Shakespeare at Nyngan High School</u>

At the mention of William Shakespeare, a collective groan of anticipated boredom can be heard in any high school across the country. Teachers and parents may even look back at the hours spent reading a 500 year old play line by line and getting lost in a sea of thees and thous. Luckily, teachers of Nyngan High School don't have to worry about that, thanks to their longstanding relationship with Bell Shakespeare.

Bell Shakespeare, a company founded in 1990, boasts that they "perform works that are timeless and borderless". With their education program, they take works that are centuries old and make them fun and accessible for any age group.

Nyngan High School has been lucky enough to work with Bell Shakespeare a number of times in the past, and continue to work with them today. More recently, all of Stage 4 and Stage 5 Drama were able to engage with Romeo and Juliet in "Just Romeo & Juliet!".

"Just Romeo & Juliet! was fantastic. They managed to get all the kids involved and even called on a few students to participate. It was great to see our young people so enthused and loving Shakespeare!" said Luke Matheson, an English teacher at Nyngan High School.

In 2019, George Kemp and Jane Mahady, two teaching artists and performers from Bell Shakespeare, completed the first Artist in Residence program at Nyngan High School. They worked with all year groups in the school, from the most enthusiastic performer to the most reluctant and nervous. Students were introduced to the Bard by hurling Shakespearean insults at each other (nobody could forget the insult-off between Travis Giles and Chad French), performing some of the most iconic Shakespeare scenes, and donning costumes to become some well-known characters like Romeo and Juliet. Bianca Scott, a Drama and English teacher at Nyngan High School, said about Bell Shakespeare "I've worked here for 7 years now and Bell Shakespeare have come out a number of times offering free performances for our kids. The students always love them. They make Shakespeare so accessible".

In 2016 and 2020 respectively, Bianca Scott and Alexandra Butchers engaged in an intensive four day program where they developed their skills in engaging students with Shakespeare. Bianca Scott described it as "the best professional learning I've ever experienced".

The way Nyngan High School teaches Shakespeare is constantly changing and evolving. Kids are engaged in the Bard now more than ever, and we understand that getting up and being active is the best way to learn.





New Graphic Novels from ASO


Still Alive by Safdar Ahmed

Still Alive is a graphic novel that documents the stories of a number of people Safdar Ahmed met while running art classes in an immigration detention centre in Villawood, Sydney. These stories are told within the broader context of Australia's immigration detention systems.

Those seeking asylum in Australia due to war, strife, or violence in their home countries face extraordinary challenges both during their journey and upon arrival. Ahmed's book focuses on people who arrive in Australia by boat. For these people, a long, perilous, journey ends with the often equally perilous obstacles they face when dealing with Australia's legal processes, with the privations of onshore and offshore detention centres, and with inadequate health and psychological support.

Still Alive interweaves journalism, history, and autobiography with a striking visual style to bring to light the crucial untold stories of refugees in Australia, and the immigration detention systems they confront here.




Holocaust: A chronicle of history and hope by Hugh Dolan Illustrator Adrian Barbu


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


Sylvie by Sylvie Kantorovitz




The House Divided Series by Haiku Hornig Illustrations by Marius Pawlitza

Book 2 - A light in the darkness, a lock in the door.




The Sad Ghost Club by Lize Meddings

The Great Gatsby, adapted by K. Woodman-Maynard



Extraordinary things just don't happen to 14yo Sydelle Mirabil, a talented weaver who dreams about life outside of her tiny village. But that all changes when a mysterious young wizard named Wayland North appears and asks for Sydelle's help. He's got a shocking secret that could stop a war between kingdoms. North needs a navigator who can mend his magical clocks and Sydelle is perfect for the job. As they race to deliver the message, they must contend with a dark wizard who will do anything to stop them.

The more Sydelle uncovers about North's past and her own strange abilities, the more she realises the fate of the kingdom may rest in her hands.
