Year 11 - Shannon Bourke






English / HSIE News

A fantastic term has come to an end and what better way to celebrate than by highlighting some fine work from our senior English students. Year 11 Advanced and Standard produced some outstanding multimodal pieces for their Term 2 assessment tasks. Advanced have been looking at The Handmaid's Tale, by Margaret Atwood, and created a digital feature article that reviews the novel as a warning of the consequences of misogyny. Standard chose a current affair close to their hearts and expressed their ideas via numerous modes.

The following, from Jack Buchanan and Amy Motley, typify the creativity and critical thought of our senior English students.

The Handmaid's Tale, by Margaret Atwood, is a disturbing and thought-provoking reimagination of the traditional dystopia. The novel employs its unique female perspective to hold a mirror up to the rising misogyny rampant back in the 80s, when Handmaid's was being written, misogyny that still leaks into every dark corner of our modern society. Atwood is able to present the image of an oppressive, patriarchal society to deliver a nuanced and layered warning about a future that is dominated by a dangerous mix of sexism, fundamentalism and conservatism. Furthermore, Atwood uses her extraordinary literary voice to connect each character and setting to a unique social, cultural or historical context that mirrors the wider societal warnings she presents throughout the novel. The Handmaids Tale is both a horrifying reflection of the current state of affairs and a terrifying prediction of what is yet to come.

The changing social context of the 1980s directly shapes the socking predictions and ideas present in The Handmaid's Tale, this connection to familiar societal belief creates verisimilitude for the readers. The 80's were a time of great political change and pushback by an increasingly dominant conservative movement. Politicians such as Ronald Reagan in America and Margaret Thatcher in Britain were highly popular because of their pragmatically conservative, nuclear family, "return to tradition" politics. These ideas are represented by those characters in power throughout the book



and are presented by Atwood as the core reason for Gilead's inception. The characterisation of Aunt Lydia is a perfect reflection of the social context of the book. An example of this can be seen when Offred describes being in the 'Red Center' and being shown what Aunt Lydia calls an "Unwomen Documentary", a documentary showcasing the Women Liberation Movement. This use of language by Atwood for Lydia demonstrates her vicious distaste for 'godless' women and her ability to belittle the handmaids through two simple words. "Unwomen Documentary" also connects to a quote by Offred in which she describes her room and situation as "for ladies in reduced circumstances. That is what we are now." This demonstrates Lydia's ability to warp the perception of the handmaids with simple conservative soundbites and push onto them the strongly patriarchal and oppressive social and political beliefs that created Gilead. The horrific actions and words of powerful and conservative characters such as Lydia force readers to consider their own social context and the power these values have in shaping their own future.



America and the western world's strong patriarchal culture and the treatment of women is a key concern examined by Atwood throughout The Handmaid's Tale. For a time, longer than the idea of 'western culture' has existed the objectification and subjectification of women has been a staple of any 'successful' culture. The objectification of women, as vessels for male desire, is of particular concern and importance to Atwood as she presents it as the cornerstone of oppressive, patriarchal societies. Throughout the book it is made clear that the sexual and cultural objectification of women that modern readers are used to has been amplified to an unsettling, even sickening degree. Women are literally made into stock for breeding, Offred goes so far as to say, "we are two-legged wombs". This is not a metaphor or some allusion to an obscure text for literary nerds, this is *plain*, *unadulterated* text displaying front and centre that to Gilead and by extension our own culture, women are nothing more than objects, a means to a despicable end. Furthermore, Atwood

describes the process by which women are so seamlessly and thoughtlessly objectified in the line "I'll take care of it...And because he said it and not her, I knew he meant to kill" this quote by Offred demonstrates how in our world and in Gilead, everyday language has been transformed into an idiom for death and analyses how easily lives are reduced to that of an object. This idiom demonstrates that the Commanders, the Wives, the Guardians all those that hold power, view the handmaids as 'its'. This desensitisation of humanity is unsettling to readers and demonstrates that by reducing someone to an 'it' you mean to 'kill', or even worse violently, systematically rape them. Atwood's connection of modern culture to the überobjectification of women is a bleak warning against an act, a set of beliefs that is silently pervading the current world and has the potential to completely infect the modern psyche.

Atwood's structuring of the novel particularly in the continual and careful use of analepsis builds a connection between our world and the world of Gilead, further strengthening the warnings she poses. The novels constant switching between detailed recollections of the present and flashbacks to the time before, connect not only the despicable aspects of culture in both times but also has the incredible effect of linking two characters across time. A perfect example of this can be seen in the way that Offred connects Aunt Lydia and her mother. Initially these two women seem complete opposites, Lydia is a fundamentalist, conservative, agent of totalitarianism, whilst Offred's mother is a progressive, feminist, disciple of female liberty. However, to Offred they are both *maternal* figures, that are *products* of their time and most importantly Offred uses both of the women's 'mottos' to make sense of the reality she faces, always flashing back to her mother for guidance, or looking for Lydia's 'wisdom' to find solace. Atwood's skilful connection of the modern world with Gilead traces a linear path from one to the other and makes it clear that her imagined future is a reality we could very well face because of the actions of our society.

The unique female perspective of The Handmaids Tale provides a terrifying and thought-provoking lens through which to view our own future. Gilead for all intents and purposes is a sickening parody of our own society, a recontextualization of the female experience. Handmaid's is Atwood's blueprint, it is her noble effort to warn society about the dangers of egotistical, power-hungry and fundamentalist maniacs (men).

Where did the term go? It has been a very busy term and I am very proud of my faculty and the awesome opportunities we have been providing for the students.

In my **School to Work** classes in Stage 5 we have been investigating what is on your payslip and in particular the costs associated with moving out of home. This was very eye opening for many students as there are many costs they did not know about. We also looked at the prices of furnishing a flat and filling a trolley with groceries. It was no surprise when many of them said they will be living at home forever!!!

Year 11 are preparing to be away Term 3 Week 3 to complete their Life Ready course along with a visit to the University of New England at Armidale. This will be a very positive week with students getting many opportunities to see Uni life firsthand.

On Thursday 24th June, 36 of our senior students will be completing their White Card at no cost under a funding program I was able to secure.

Mr Warburton has finished his time at Nyngan High School and we would like to express our sincere appreciation for his support of our students and the programs we run.

Mrs Smith's Sports Coaching are continuing with their 'Community Coach' unit. They have been coaching Girilambone and Hermidale Public Schools for an upcoming Touch Football game along with coaching sports teams within the community to accrue hours to gain competency for this module.

Preliminary PDHPE are completing a biomechanics unit and HSC PDHPE are finishing off their Sports Medicine unit by learning how to manage injury rehabilitation through taping.

Stage 5 PASS are examining the relationship between nutrition and exercise taking into account the energy requirements needed for physical activity.

Miss Strachan's Stage 4 Technology Mandatory Food and Agriculture have been learning all about using the kitchen and its equipment safely, hygiene and food safety and healthy eating. Students were fascinated during our lesson on correct hand washing techniques where we used a solution and a UV light to see the common areas missed. We have been busy baking healthy treats like Low GI Brownies and High Fibre Sticky Date Cupcakes which have been a hit!







Stage 5 Food Technology have been working through the topic Food Service and Catering this term cooking lots of great dishes such as Lemon Myrtle Cheesecake, Omelette Bites and Ice Cream Sandwiches with homemade ice cream!

During our practical assessment, students showcased their culinary skills with Loaded Fries, Burritos, Dumplings, Wedge Works, Works Burgers, Pancakes and Freakshakes.

Stage 6 Hospitality have been smashing out lots of yummy dishes such as Carbonara, Meatball Subs and Churro Ice Cream Bowls during our time together. Year 12 completed a practical assessment Bogan Eats where teachers ordered their lunch and received it Uber Eats style. Year 11 contributed by making the accompanying drinks as a part of their competency practice for the unit 'Prepare and serve non-alcoholic beverages'.











This term **Miss Paton's Stage 5 Timber Technology** class has been producing magazine racks. The students gained new skills in turning on the lathe creating a cylindrical handle. They used a decorative feature of pyrography using the wood burner on the side of the rack.

Stage 5 Metal Technology have been creating a rocket stove. Rocket stoves are designed to use less timber then a fire for cooking while camping. The students have developed and furthered their skills in welding, measuring, marking and cutting using the cold saw.

Stage 4 have begun a mixed materials unit using recycled milk bottles, timber and steel. They have started the project by designing a timber backboard which will have attached steel coat hooks. Their designs incorporate both the recycled plastics and Aboriginal symbols.

The students have created some wonderful posters on Aboriginal constellations and shared some cultural stories. 


