### Maths/CAPA Newsletter

**Year 12 Advanced Mathematics** will complete their final Mathematics lesson at Nyngan High School on Tuesday the 20th. Jack and Tsitsi have worked incredibly hard to be where they are and should be exceptionally proud of their effort. There is still time before their HSC and I'm sure they will both be using every minute wisely.

Year 12 Mathematics Standard 2 has been an absolute pleasure to teach and I will miss their diligence, honesty and cheerfulness in all things Mathematics and their world. This fantastic group of students know how to support each other and encourage each other to keep going when life gets tough. I am so excited by the results they will potentially achieve in the HSC examination but more so about where their life will take them when they leave Nyngan High School.



**Stage 5** have just completed their topic on similar triangles where they used a metre ruler to compare the shadow length of it to the shadow length of the water tower. This allowed them to calculate the height of the tower. They are now laying the foundational work with algebra to move onto bigger and better things.

Stage 4 have finished their unit on equations and have now started a new unit on ratios. Students have been investigating ratios in a variety of contexts including maps and using ratios in everyday life. Students also recently completed their timezone assessment, where students planned a worldwide trip around the world, navigating timezones as they go along.





### Stage 5 English:





### Science/Special Ed

As Term Three nears the end, it is busy as ever. But most of all for our Year 12 cohort, they have been working hard, consolidating their learning as they count down to their last day of their formal school education. Year 12, 2022 have been a wonderful group of students and I would like to wish them all the best for the HSC examinations and the future beyond school.

Year 11 students have now completed their Preliminary HSC Examinations which marks the end of their Preliminary courses. They are receiving their results this week, with some students achieving some very pleasing results. Well done on your efforts throughout the year and best wishes as you commence your HSC courses next term.

Stage 5 Science have been learning about genetics, as part of this unit students have enjoyed building edible DNA models. They are also working on Individual Research Projects, which allows them to question and explore an area of their own personal interest. Students are to conduct their own experiment and present it as a scientific report. All students in Stage 5 should have now, with support from their teacher, selected a project and most will have started their experiment. The task is their major assessment task for the year and is due at the end of Week Two next term. Each student has a booklet with worked examples, please encourage your child to refer to this if they need help and of course talk to their class teacher for further assistance. A homework session will be held in the library on Thursday afternoon Week One from 3.20 – 4.30pm. I encourage all Stage 5 students to attend to work on their project with support from their science teachers available.

Stage 4 Science this term have been learning about rocks, minerals and the rock cycle. As part of this unit they are currently looking at the Earth's Resources and how we use them. This has had students thinking about recycling and waste products. Next term there will be an excursion to look first hand at some of the recycling and waste disposal methods used in our community. Stage 4 have also completed a Guided Research Experiment as their major assessment task for Semester Two, this task has allowed students to improve their working, scientifically skills look deeper into why different liquids behave as they do.

Our MC students have continued to work hard on improving their skills across all subjects. In tech mandatory, students have been designing and making dolls as part of their textiles units, which some outstanding individual creations. Well Done to Dominic Radford who is the MC Student of the Term for this term.

Thank you to Mrs Waterhouse for taking on Relieving Head Teacher Science while I took some long service leave earlier this term. She did a wonderful job, the faculty was in excellent hands. Wishing our whole school community a happy and safe holiday.

### Ronny Gibbs 7's Tournament

Nyngan High walked away victorious on multiple fronts from the Ronny Gibbs 7's tournament this Wednesday, travelling to Bourke for the first time since 2019 after the tournament had been wiped out for the past couple of years thanks to the dreaded Covid pandemic.

Five Nyngan High teams, distributed between Netball and Rugby League entered the competition, desperate to take on some of the strongest schools in the far west region of NSW in a battle for both bragging rights and superiority.

Competing against teams from Baradine, Trangie, Warren, Brewarrina, Bourke and Cobar, Nyngan High were keen to assert their dominance and prove, once again, that we are the supreme sporting school out this way.

Our Under 14's rugby league side were the first cab off the rank and were drawn to face the might of Trangie Central School in the first pool game. Trangie tried valiantly, but the skill, speed and finesse of Archie Black and Dominic Burley proved too hot for them to handle. Arch and Doc combined for 6 tries in an 8-1 victory which had the confidence of our boys' sky high and the other teams in the tournament looking over their shoulders.

That confidence was short-lived, however, as they quickly realised that up next was Brewarrina Central School, home to the prodigious Zeke Hardy, one of the finest young footy talents to present out this way in many a year. Zeke is a teammate of many of our boys and, such is his ability, they were terrified, or at least appeared to be, to tackle him.

Brewarrina raced to a 5-1 lead in the first half and our fellas appeared to lack the necessary answers to combat what was an impressive Brewarrina onslaught. Jayden Smith and Dominic Burley attempted to mount a counterattack in the second half, crossing for a brace each, but it wasn't enough, and they were defeated 7-4.

That loss meant they were rendered unable to finish 1st or 2nd and would be left to battle it out for the bronze medal. The draw meant that they would face Baradine, a team who travelled a hell of a long way to compete. Nerves were aplenty early, but when Archie Black crossed, it opened the floodgates and our fellas poured on the pressure, scoring further tries through Dominic Burley, Matt Lynch, and Jayden Smith to lead 6-1 at the break.

Shortly after halftime, Matt Lynch, who had been encouraged to start defending with a little more venom and vigour, performed what can only be described as the perfect bootlaces tackle. The whiplash from the impact with the ground, unfortunately, resulted in his Baradine opponent writhing on the ground with a neck injury and Matt Lynch strutting around the field like Ric Flair in the late 80s. The game, and an ambulance, was called shortly thereafter and our boys walked away with the bronze medal with the score still stalled at 6-1.

All boys tried hard and had some bright moments, both individually and as part of a team, however, when the dust had settled these players were voted by their peers as best on ground:

3 points- Jayden Smith

2 points - Archie Black

1 point - Santana Odeng/ Dominic Burley

The Opens rugby league boys had an even mix of skill and toughness across the park and expectations were high. In a pregame interview with the Big Marn, Darryl Brohman, captain Digby Barrow showed just how confident our boys were when he said, "We have an amazing coach, a great playing roster and attend the best school in NSW, maybe even Australia, so I fully expect to finish the day undefeated". Brave words, but Digby may possess clairvoyant abilities as, spoiler alert, that's exactly how things played out.

Brewarrina Central were the first opponent and it was a bit of a back-and-forth battle to begin. Will Black showed his class in this one though as he scored a hat trick of tries and laid on two others, looking a class above throughout. He was supported by Brook Cadrakilagi and Sonny Calton who both crossed for tries, as well as Digby, who provided excellent service from dummy half.

A battle with Warren loomed next and it would prove very interesting, as many of our boys and their boys play together as part of the Grand Final winning Nyngan Tigers Under 18's side. The game, quite frankly, started out as a joke, with both sides seemingly intent on playing a game of catch and cuddle rather than footy, to avoid the risk of injury. Understandable, but terrible viewing.

Tries were abundant and defence basically non-existent until Byron Mulheron and Will Mudford said "Na brah". Byron made many an in-road into the Warren defensive line, as did Will, who played with courage and tenacity far belying his age. These boys were, in my opinion, the difference, along with Connor Burley, Riley Wood and Shannon Bourke and Nyngan emerged victorious 9-7, and would progress to face Cobar High School in the final.

Cobar were a big, mobile side, looking far older than they are and would prove quite the challenge for our boys. Thankfully, this challenge forced Nyngan High to switch on and have an actual dig, rather than the dross that was served up in the previous game. The real Will Black stood up in this one and he put on an absolute masterclass. He crossed for his second hat trick of the day and made it look easy, despite playing against opponents that would outweigh him by at least 20kg. This kid has so much time, is so selfless and makes his teammates look a million dollars. It's a pleasure to watch him to play and you'd love to have him as a teammate.

Charlie Kelly and Byron Mulheron were also awesome, but the surprise packet of the tournament, and the man who really helped propel Nyngan High to victory, was school captain Jack Buchanan. Jack was phenomenal in the final, charging hard into the opposition defensive line and tackling like a man possessed. I have honestly never seen him play better and his defence stopped many a Cobar attacking raid and saved a couple of certain tries. He was sequestered for an interview by ASADA officials following the game, which should tell you just how good he was in this one. Dave and Tanya would have been proud. Pat and Veronica definitely were.

Nyngan proved just a little too classy for Cobar and emerged as the Ronny Gibbs 7's Opens champions with what was a pretty great 6-3 victory. Well done.

### A Walk in the Dark by Jane Goodwin



Three misfits, two warring spirits, one chance to save the world.


