Principals Report

It is with great privilege and humility that I welcome all students, staff and families to Nyngan High School for 2024. Our school community is extremely fortunate to have such a great school which is situated on impressive grounds, possesses well-resourced and improving teaching facilities and a neatly attired student body who show great pride in their school uniform.

Additionally we have had a wonderful start to 2024. Our student numbers are on par with the anticipated enrolments for this year, which will all-but ensure we can deliver the curriculum which was set-up for this year. Our school staff have returned with a positive vibe and undertaken professional learning around mindfully caring for student wellbeing and the student body has generally settled very well into their classes.

On the first days of the school year I spoke with the student body and staff about our common goals as a school and also the Department of Education Student code of conduct.

Throughout the year in our school, I will ask members of our school community to reflect on this during conversations. Voluntary Contributions & Course Fees

An important aspect of school life and everyday life is paying for the goods and services you use. We are also entitled to some things as part of a public service to young people. As such I would like to highlight and encourage the payment of course fees.

Course fees relate to the Elective courses students elect to undertake from Year 9 onwards. These fees cover the materials used in the construction of projects, the creation of food items or for learning materials. These fees must be paid to ensure your child can participate in the learning of skills and knowledge which will benefit their future.

Payments for course fees can be made to the school front office during school hours and are due by the end of Term 1. These are also courses which parents have supported their child undertaking. If these fees are unable to be paid please contact the Principal to make an alternative payment schedule.

Voluntary contributions are payments which support the school to operate. These payments are greatly appreciated and will help to ensure students are provided with a continued supply of learning resources, complimented by funds from the school's budget. I would encourage all families to pay the voluntary contribution as soon as possible. Please contact the school office for further enquiries.

School Celebrations

School Uniform

Our school has always set a very high standard with the wearing of school uniform. It is a wonderful feature of Nyngan High School and is something that visitors to our school always make positive comments about.

I will remind everyone that in 2024 students who are consistently out of uniform, without explanation, will not be allowed to represent the school or attend some excursions. This is a high expectation and I make no apologies for that. Where families require financial support for some items of school clothing, I am happy to negotiate and support those needs.

Yondr Pouch Implementation

Nyngan High School will be refreshing our understanding and usage of Yondr pouches to make our school a phone-free space to improve teaching and learning. The Yondr Program employs a simple, lockable pouch that stores a mobile phone. Every student will secure their phone in their personally assigned Yondr pouch when they arrive at school each morning. They will maintain possession of their phones, and will not use them until they are unlocked at the end of the school day. Students are required to bring their Yondr pouch to and from school each day and are responsible for their pouch at all times.

In an effort to best serve your child, we appreciate your full support in adoption of the Yondr Program at our school. We ask parents to communicate with their students during the day through the front office. We also ask that if you are intending on picking a student up early or giving permission for your student to leave that you record your reasons with the fantastic and helpful ladies in front office.



Music

Miss Pamilar has kicked off the year getting to know all the music students and is eagerly looking forward to continuing the journey of teaching and learning together with each and every one of them.

Stage 4: Introduction to Music

This term, Stage 4 will have the opportunity to play the ukulele and delve into the rhythmic beats of ANZAC drumming. Throughout the term, they will not only aim to master the art of playing various instruments through performance and composition, but their understanding of music theory fundamentals will grow.

Stage 5: Reuse, Reduce and Recycle

Stage 5 will be working on their musical innovation and creativity through their unit 'Reuse, Reduce and Recycle. They will be exploring the fascinating concept of repurposing music from your surroundings to craft brand new compositions on a new program called Soundtrap. In addition to that, students will also be honing their performance skills as they work on their individual pieces.

Stage 6: Rock Music

This term, students in Stage 6 will be exploring the rich history of rock music, tracing its evolution to the present day, and explore how it has transformed over the years. In addition to learning about the history of rock, Year 11 and Year 12 students will also be honing their performance skills and be working on a viva voce. Furthermore, Year 12 students will be revisiting and refining their performance pieces from last term.

Art

Mrs Quinn and Miss Hughan are excited to be back at school and are looking forward to teaching art for 2024. Stage 4 is completing a unit on portraits. They are learning to contour draw each other. While the Year 7's were away at camp the Year 8's completed some painting exercises using dripping paint and painting 'Bob Ross' style using easels and using pallet knives.

Stage 5 are learning about the frames whilst completing portraits with a twist. The reverse self-portraits will be of the back of their heads. Students focus on developing tone and texture in their drawings.

Zoe and Wayne, who are in Year 12, have been learning about "Art of the past" starting with the renaissance. Alongside this they have also been working hard on the Body of Works, which will be sent off to Sydney to be marked in August.

The Year 11 art cohort have just begun learning about the 3 content areas of the Visual Arts syllabus. The Frames, the Conceptual Framework and Artist's Practice. They have done some drawing skills in preparation to draw a classmate and completed a charcoal drawing imitating the practice of Frank Auerbach.


English/Support





Congratulations are in order for Claire Robb and Meg Meldrum who topped the first Year 12 assessment.



Packed with first-person experiences and interviews, the Anti-Racism Kit explores what it means to rise above as a young person of colour in Australia today, and how to be a force for change..




Totally deceased by Sue H. Cunningham


Channel Fear by Lisa Richardson
