Congratulations to all students who have been striving to achieve their best in the recent Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 NAPLAN tests. Data collected from this process allows teachers to better understand students individual and collective learning needs and plan lessons accordingly.



Science Newsletter

Stage 4

Stage 4 are investigating elements and compounds. One of the chemical reactions 4SC Yinka have looked at is extracting Copper Metal from Copper Sulphate.

We used electric current to break the Copper Sulphate into Copper and Sulphuric acid, a similar process to what has been used at Tritton mine in the past.



Stage 5



Stage 5 have been busy building a mini theme park for their Term 1 Assessment Task. Their job is to build a scale model of a rollercoaster, then develop a scientific report that describes the forces and motion of a marble throughout the ride.

Students are really enjoying building their rides and according to Harry Williams, it is "really satisfying" seeing their work in action and makes the research part of the task more relevant.

By including more project-based learning in Science we hope to engage students more deeply, develop their critical thinking and teamwork skills.

In HSC Biology we've been investigating non-infectious diseases, looking at how specific organs function and discussing ways that function can be impaired.

The Bogan Shire staff were supportive of the project. Kirsty Burley stressed the importance of the experience, saying, "I think everyone should have to do this at school. Having done this once at school, and having prepared an application and been to an interview - should make a big difference to when students have to do this for a real job."

Kirsty and Kearah Dutschke visited Nyngan High School to guide the students through the application process, offering tips for their resume and cover letter. They helped students with selection criteria questions and gave them tips for the nerve-wracking experience of attending the interview. Together with class teacher Mr. Milligan, Kirsty and Kearah set up an 'Outdoor Job' and 'Indoor Job' using the Bogan Shire online platform so that students could experience the job application process realistically. Students submitted their application online and then attended the mock interviews.

Mr. Milligan, Kirsty, and Kearah were impressed by the quality of some of the applications and the students' conduct during the interviews. They noted that the students presented themselves confidently and gave well-thought-out answers, even better than many adults applying for positions.

In Belle and Joni's world there are two options for girls.


One, follow the rules of the Doctrine like Belle: apply your Mask, work hard to be crowned at the Ceremony, be a Pretty.


Always will be by Mykaela Saunders

Stories of Goori sovereignty from the futures of the Tweed.


In this stunningly inventive and thought provoking collection, Mykaela Saunders poses the question: what might country, community, and culture look life if First Nations sovereignty was asserted?

Each of the stories in *Always will be* is set in its own future version of the Tweed. In one, a group of girls plot their escape from an institution they have no memory of entering. In another, two men made a final visit to the country they love as they contemplate a new life in a faraway place. Saunders imagines different scenarios for how the local Aboriginal community might exercise their sovereignty—reclaiming country, exerting full self-determination, or incorporating non-Indigenous people into the social fabric—while practising creative ancestrally approved ways of living with the changing climates.

Epic in scope, and with a diverse cast of characters, *Always will be* is a forward thinking collection that refuses cynicism and despair, and instead offers captivating stories that celebrate Goori ways of being, knowing, doing, and becoming.
