Principals Report

Dear School Community,

When life is at its busiest and when I may be searching for perspective on how to move forward, I often think about times when I personally struggled.


Remembering the hardships, I may have faced, remembering the feelings of loneliness or the moments when all seemed lost. We all have these times.

Acknowledging country is a sign of respect and at Nyngan High School respect is a core value that we promote every day and we should utilise every opportunity to use respect in any way that we can to build strong connections with people.

Respect not only makes other people feel good but also benefits ourselves. Feeling good ensures that we are giving ourselves the best opportunity to learn and grow. Remember that school is just part of your life journey and the fun really begins now. All I wish for each of you is that you believe in yourself and never sell yourself short or make excuses. There is a big wide world out there ready to be conquered, so take every opportunity that comes your way. And if it doesn't come your way, go and find it. Your future is bright and beautiful just like each of you.

Intertwined with the end of Year 12 are our annual NAIDOC Week celebrations where we recognise the achievements, culture and history of our first nation people. It is a time for all Australians from all walks of life to come together and recognise the valuable contributions Aboriginal people make to our nation, in particular this year, the strong women in our lives. On Monday I had the privilege of speaking about Raylene Weldon, our valued AEO and I would like to share these words with our whole school community below.

Yamakarra. I respectfully acknowledge the Wongaibon people who are the traditional custodians of the land and pay my respects to elders past and present and extend that to everyone here today on this important and wonderful celebration.

With the theme "Because of Her We Can", NAIDOC Week 2018 celebrates the invaluable contributions that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women have made – and continue to make - to our communities, our families, our rich history and to our nation. One woman, who epitomizes this year's theme, is a young woman I call a colleague, an educator, an equal and most importantly a friend. Raylene Weldon is a leader, a trailblazer and an advocate for social change and equal rights for all Aboriginal people.

I have worked alongside Raylene for the past 7 years and during this time, I have learned so much. My relationship with Raylene has flourished and during our time together at Nyngan High Raylene has guided me, inspired me and most importantly supported me in making advances in Aboriginal Education. When I first returned to Nyngan High School in 2007 as a young inexperienced teacher I was surprised to find that Aboriginal Education was extremely limited, and without Raylene we would not have the outstanding programs we do today. We have been on an incredible journey, implementing the first Aboriginal Language program of its kind not just in Nyngan but, it has been widely acknowledged, across the state. We continue to provide educational opportunities for students' to learn about their culture, identity and self-determination and Raylene has been instrumental in ensuring this is delivered in a culturally appropriate format.

Raylene is a strong Wayilwan/Gomeroi woman and she has shared many stages of her story with me. She tells of her mother being born in a tent under a tree at Tiger Bay in Warren because she was unable to give birth in a hospital at that time due to Aboriginality. This was the start of the many struggles and injustices Raylene's family has faced and continues to face in our country today with the significant gaps in education, life expectancy, health and high incarceration rates. Raylene says she gained her strength from her mother and father who faced challenges of racism, discrimination, segregation, dispossession and Assimilation due to government policies. Amidst their adversity they taught her to be proud and fierce and to never give up. Today, Raylene is a mother, an elder, a grandmother, an aunty, a sister and a daughter, a friend and her most valued possession and time spent in this world is her family.

I feel honored that Raylene has shared her many stories with me – stories of heart break, racism and times of feeling invisible. These stories have provided me with insight and more understanding, and have ignited my own passion for fighting against Aboriginal injustices particularly in education. Raylene is a strong woman and is a positive example to many young Aboriginal students at Nyngan High. She has never allowed disadvantage to define her path and has embraced opportunities. She is currently studying a Bachelor of Educational Studies with Business Studies as a minor and previously completed her Aboriginal Education Assistant Certificate at Sydney University. She continues to encourage others to follow this path. Raylene is proactive in her political views and stands up for her beliefs by voicing these at rallies, protests and marches, calling for national reform and social justice.

Some people may be a little confronted by Raylene's passion and determination, in her quest for a better life, greater opportunities and equal rights - for children, families and all Aboriginal people. Her passion inspires, empowers and encourages me to stand beside her to help make a difference. Perhaps the biggest lesson Raylene has taught me is this - We do not choose the lives we are born into, but we can choose to use our disadvantage or advantage to affect positive change for ourselves and others. Raylene's achievements, her voice, her unwavering passion paves the way for generations to come and I hope she knows how much I personally value and appreciate her knowledge and support. She has told me on more than one occasion that she has my back and Raylene I hope you know I've always got your back as we continue to work together to make positive changes in bridging the gap through education.

Thank you for another great term at Nyngan High School and remember 'nothing in this world worth having comes easy'.

Our community continues to strengthen and become more knowledgeable in regards to the impact of colonisation of Australia's First Nation People and their continued plight for social justice and equity. Only in Unity we can overcome barriers of suppression, allowing us to transform a nation of equity and inclusiveness of cultural diversity.

We pay tribute and solute all the strong Aboriginal women in our community who have paved and created an equitable environment for us to grow and learn. Thank you for continuing the journey of social justice and equity.

We hold great pride in our school environment in regards to strengthening our cultural knowledge via the transmission of professional learning and a culturally inclusive curriculum. This process involves the implementation of Aboriginal perspectives to be embedded in our everyday learning at Nyngan High School.

Our NAIDOC Week Celebrations begun with the Official Opening and march down our main street, and a ceremony at the Bogan Shire Council. These two valuable services are still functioning in the Nyngan Community today by strong women – Veneta Dutton, Marea Johnson and Lesly Ryan. Ella Meldrum delivered a powerful speech in regards to the Honourable Linda Burney. Mrs Ange Bush delivered a speech in regards to a predominate Aboriginal women who has made significance in her life, speaking about the challenges and successes of our AEO- Raylene Weldon and her professional teachings allowing Mrs Bush and staff to gain cultural wisdom and knowledge.

Tuesday delivered our annual "NAIDOC Cultural Showcase Day, which begun with a special morning tea and a flag raising ceremony with invited Elders, Aunty Betty Carney and Uncle Dick Carney and guests Mitch Munro, Tim Naden, Marea Johnson, Katie White, Katie Sinclair and Priscilla Lord joining us in our celebrations. Our special guest speaker was Mrs Judy Patterson who spoke about growing up in our beautiful community and life achievements of hairdressing, NAISDA – Aboriginal Dance, Boarding House Parent, family and the importance of showing up every day for work or school. Our day concluded with several activity stations operated by staff and guests consisting of art, dance, school band, johnny cakes and TIG games.
